





Detailed Itinerary

Day 1

Arrive at OR Tambo International Airport, where you will be met by our representative. Transfer to the Rovos Rail boarding station in Pretoria and check-in for your 3 night journey to Cape Town. Spend the day at leisure aboard the most luxurious train in the world. Lunch, high tea and dinner will be served in the dining and lounge carts.

Day 2

Start the day with breakfast in the dining cart, followed by some time at leisure before lunch. After lunch, you'll disembark from the train for a day outing to Kimberley, which will include a visit to the Kimberley Diamond Museum and The Big Hole. Return to the train in time to freshen up before dinner.

Day 3

Spend the day at leisure aboard the train, enjoying the stunning views of the South African countryside from your cabin window or the observation cart of the train. Breakfast, lunch, high tea and dinner will be served aboard the train.

Day 4

Breakfast will be served in the dining cart, after which you will disembark the train in Cape Town. You will be met by our representative and transferred to Stellenbosch in the Cape Winelands. Check-in at Lanzerac Hotel & Spa for 5 nights. Enjoy your afternoon at leisure.

Day 5

After breakfast, you will be collected at the hotel and transferred to De Zalze Golf Club for your round. After your game, return to the hotel for an afternoon at leisure.

Day 6

Spend the day at leisure, perhaps exploring one of the dozens of world-class wine estates within the vicinity of the hotel.

Day 7

After breakfast, you will be collected at the hotel and transferred to Erinvale Golf Club in Somerset West for your round. After your game, return to the hotel for an afternoon at leisure.

Day 8

After breakfast, you will be transferred to Franschhoek for your round of golf at Pearl Valley Golf Club. Return to the hotel in the afternoon.

Day 9

After breakfast, you will be collected at the hotel and transferred to Cape Town Airport for your outbound flight.



Day 1 - 4 | Pretoria



Area Overview

For Rovos Rail passengers, a highlight of their journey is a visit to the private station at Capital Park, Pretoria. The once-bustling hub of steam locomotion is now the headquarters for Rovos Rail. The gracious railway station serves as the departure or arrival point for most of the train journeys.

The property boasts an ever-expanding railway museum – showing a historical collection of train paraphernalia – in addition to its other comprehensive facilities and will, with the addition of semaphore signals and a footbridge, recreate the atmosphere of a fully-fledged railway system. It is intended that, with time, this facility should become the foremost working train museum in the world.

The eyes of rail enthusiasts will be drawn to the vast carriage and locomotive sheds where teams of dedicated personnel keep the rolling stock in perfect order. This roofed workshop of 10,000 m2 straddles 15 railway lines with concrete inspection pits below, and is the ultimate repair and maintenance facility for any train operation. The low, red-bricked buildings alongside the new 300 m platform house laundries, gleaming stainless-steel kitchens, and well-stocked storerooms. This is the busy hub of a provisioning operation that is world-class in terms of efficiency and attention to detail.

Property Overview

Each train has accommodation carriages, dining cars (± 42 seats), a lounge car (± 26 seats), small gift shop, smoking lounge (± 11 seats), and observation car (± 32 seats) with an open-air balcony. Maintaining the spirit of a bygone era, there are no radios or television sets on board. The three types of suites available – Pullman (7 m2), Deluxe (10 m2), and Royal (16 m2) – offer passengers privacy and comfort with double or twin beds and fittings and facilities that are of the highest standard.

All travellers are welcome – singles, couples, and groups. The dining cars are made up of two-seaters and four-seaters where guests eat together or individually. The lounge and observation cars – with their big picture windows, sofas, and booths – make for great mingling areas or quiet corners to while away the days.

Many of the passengers enjoy the formality of fine china and glassware, crisp linen, and silver, and dress accordingly. Days on board are smart casual while evening attire is more formal. On long journeys guests enjoy themed evenings where they can dress up accordingly or opt for smart casual.

An enthusiastic team of chefs is responsible for overseeing the very important task of ensuring guests' every need is catered for. There's an emphasis on fresh local ingredients and traditional dishes are a specialty. Meals are served in one sitting only in the dining cars and are complemented by a selection of fine South African wines. The bar menu is comprehensive although special items such as French Champagne need to be requested in advance.

Observation Cars

The observation car seats ± 32 passengers. With its open-air balcony, big picture windows, bar, sofas, and booths, it has great mingling areas or quiet corners to while away the days. On most days, afternoon tea is served at 16:30 in the lounge and observation cars while bar service is from $\pm 07:00-01:00$.

Lounge Cars

The lounge car seats ± 26 passengers. With its big picture windows, sofas and wingbacks, it has great mingling areas or quiet corners to while away the days. On most days, afternoon tea is served at 16:30 in the lounge and observation cars while bar service is from $\pm 07:00-01:00$. On some of our long journeys, an onboard historian hosts lectures in the lounge car. At one end of the carriage there is a small gift shop, which is a smart, subtly-lit glass affair selling bespoke memorabilia.

Dining Cars

The dining cars seat ±42 passengers each. Dependent on the number of passengers on a journey, the train is setup with one or two dining cars. They are made up of two-seaters and four-seaters where guests eat together or individually. Meals are served in one sitting only. Breakfast: 07:00-10:00 • Lunch: 13:00 • Formal Dinner: 19:30. All meals are served at these times unless otherwise stated in the itinerary. Hot breakfast items are made to order while lunch and dinner are four-course meals complemented by fine South African wines. The bar menu is comprehensive although special items need to be requested in advance.

Club Cars

The Club Car area was created by demolishing the end suite in a Deluxe carriage. This was done specifically to host the smokers on the train in a public area and also as an overflow facility adjoining the Observation Car. With a glass passage wall, guests can comfortably watch the scenery on both sides of the train.

Accommodations

Deluxe Suites

The Deluxe Suites accommodate one or two passengers in double or twin beds and have their own lounge area and en-suite bathroom with shower, toilet and basin. A dedicated host/ess is available at all times and services the suites daily. A bar fridge is filled with the on-board beverages of the passengers' choice.

Day 4 - 9 | Stellenbosch



Area Overview

Founded in 1679, Stellenbosch is the second oldest European settlement in the Western province, after Cape Town. This historic town is known for oak lined cobblestone streets, classic Cape Dutch architecture, and its vibrant wine industry. Stellenbosch is a very walkable town with many small shops, boutiques, art galleries, some fabulous local restaurants and vineyards, and more than 100 wine cellars. There are a number of excellent hikes in the Jonkershoek Nature Reserve, as well as a full day Vineyard Hiking Trail which winds its way through vineyards, forests, olive groves, and coastal renosterveld.

Stellenbosch, along with nearby Paarl and Franschhoek, forms part of the Cape Winelands, the largest contributors to the one billion liters of wine produced in South Africa annually. It is approximately 50 km (30 mi) east of Cape Town, on a scenic road lined with breathtaking mountain ranges, green rolling hills and valleys and, as one approaches the Winelands, vineyards roll out in all directions. It is home to the University of Stellenbosch, founded in 1863, and today one of South Africa's leading universities with nearly 30,000 students.

Day 4 - 9 | Lanzerac Hotel & Spa

Day 5 | De Zalze Golf Club

Activity overview

Having hosted both the Eisenhower Trophy and the Espirito Santo Trophy in October 2006, the De Zalze Golf Club, set on the 300-hectare greater Kliene Zalze Estate, is laid out in the midst of working vineyards and orchards backed by the spectacular Stellenbosch Mountain range. Located in the heart of the famous winelands of Stellenbosch, findly known as 'Little Europe', the superb holes are set on rolling and undulating terrain, meandering between grape on the vine, fruit on the tree and an array of great water features.

Renowned golf course architect, Peter Matkovich, has lent his name to the course, making most of the stunning setting while placing a premium on accuracy. The course has excellent Kikuyu fairways and large Bent Grass greens, all with the Matkovich trademark of finely manicured aprons. De Zalze offers a fine mix of parkland holes, its main defences being the water features on several of the holes. The oak-lined Blaauwklippen River winds its way through the golf estate and comes into play at various intervals.

Day 7 | Erinvale Country & Golf Estate

Activity overview

The Erinvale golf course, designed by the legendary Gary Player, is conveniently located on the borders of Somerset West and only half an hour from the vibrant Cape Town. Having hosted the 1996 World Cup of Golf and the second oldest tournament in the world, the prestigious SAA Open in 2003 and 2004, Erinvale is no stranger to worldwide media coverage.

Built on a narrow stretch of land which escalates sharply uphill, Erinvale is an estate course with two distinctly different nines. The front nine is flat, winding its way through the park-like terrain estate which calls for challenging approach shots to the long narrow putting surfaces, while the back nine meanders through the foothills of the magnificent Helderberg, with breathtaking views of the False Bay coastline from the top holes. The signature par-four 17th hole requires golfers to play downhill from an elevated tee, with tall pines flanking one side of the fairway, and an out-of-bounds fence the other



Day 8 | Pearl Valley Signature Golf Course

Activity overview

Located between the magnificent Simonsberg and Drakenstein Mountain Ranges, Pearl Valley Signature Course shares its borders with two of the most well-known and picturesque winemaking towns in the Cape - Paarl and Franschhoek. From the vineyards and orchards that border the course to the mighty Berg River flowing through it to the mountainous backdrops of every hole, playing here is an experience that cannot be adequately described in words.

Golf legend Jack Nicklaus has used his abundant store of knowledge and experience in the game to develop the most visually spectacular golf course in the country. The design of the Pearl Valley Golf Course has received praises galore for its magnificent rich, deep, green all-season fairways and the clever use of dazzling water features, which often protect the splendid large and subtle bent grass greens. The bunkers, in true Nicklaus fashion, are shallow, long and relatively undaunting.
